Emerging Adult Gambling Screen Short Form (EAGS-4)

The Emerging Adult Gambling Screen Short Form (EAGS-4) is a brief, 4 item, measure of gambling-related harms among emerging adults (aged 18-24). It is a tool that can be used to screen a person who may be suffering from gambling-related harms. It is not intended to be used as a diagnostic tool for gambling disorder.

Question	Yes	No
In the past 12 months, have you lied or hid from others the amount of money you won or lost betting &/or gambling?		
In the past 12 months, has someone asked you to stop betting &/or gambling?		
In the past 12 months, have you bet &/or gambled with money that was intended for other purposes, such as rent, tuition, books, gas, or social activities?		
In the past 12 months, has betting &/or gambling become a major focus of your social activities and/or conversations?		

Scoring: Yes to 1 or more indicates a need for further assessment

Potential Responses:

For those scoring 1 or higher: By responding <u>yes</u> to at least one of the gambling screening questions, you may be at risk of or experiencing gambling-related harms. If you or someone you know needs support to minimize gambling-related harms or stop gambling, help and resources are available:
